CRIMESTOPPERS Increases Award for the Capture of Convicted Felon Deloyd Jones Sought for One Count of Murder and Three Counts of Attempted Murder for Two Separate Incidents

CRIMESTOPPERS has increased the reward to **\$5,000** for the capture of **19-year-old Deloyd Jones**. Jones is wanted in connection with the murder of Devin Hutton, 22, and the shooting of a 34-year-old local male. The offense occurred on January 17, 2011, shortly before 10:00 P.M., in the 2800 block of *Urquhart Street*

Fifth District officers responded to a call of a “shooting” and upon their arrival, officers located Hutton inside of an apartment and a 34-year-old male outside the apartment suffering from multiple gunshot wounds to their bodies. Emergency medical technicians arrived where Hutton was pronounced dead on scene and the 34-year-old male was transported to a local hospital where he is listed in critical condition.

A preliminary investigation indicates that the motive was robbery. Jones and two (2) unidentified African American males gained entry into the apartment and demanded money. After the victims complied with the suspects’ demands, the suspects opened fire on the victims and fled the scene.

Throughout the course of the investigation, Homicide Detective Ryan Aucoin positively identified Deloyd Jones as one of the persons responsible for the murder of Hutton and the shooting of a 34-year-old local male. Detective Aucoin secured an arrest warrant for one (1) count of first-degree murder and one (1) count of attempted first degree murder. Jones is also currently wanted for two (2) additional counts of attempted murder. The offense occurred on January 6, 2011, shortly after 4:30 A.M., in the 1900 block of Spain Street

Fifth District officers responded to a call of a “shooting” and upon their arrival, officers located a 38-year-old male suffering from a single gunshot wound to the leg and a 34-year-old female suffering from multiple gunshot wounds to the body.

Jones was positively identified as the person responsible for the shooting in this incident.

Deloyd Jones should be considered armed and extremely dangerous.

Jones is currently on probation for discharge of a firearm during a violent crime and has prior arrest(s) for attempted first degree murder (2010), criminal trespass (2010), illegal carrying weapons (2010, 2009), illegal use of weapon (2010, 2009), aggravated criminal damage (2010), aggravated battery (2010, 2009), warrant(s) (2010, 2007), possession of a stolen auto (2009), traffic violations (2009, 2007), attachments (2009), disturbing the peace (2009), resisting/obstructing an officer (2009), simple criminal damage under \$500 (2008, 2007), simple escape (2008), numerous curfew violations (2007, 2006, 2004), concealed weapon first (2007), concealed weapon second (2007), misrepresentation during booking (2007, 2005), criminal trespass (2007), possession of stolen property (2007, 2005), armed robbery (2007), possession of marijuana (2007, 2005), possession of schedule II narcotics

(2006), cruelty to animals (2005), distribution of schedule II narcotics (2005), theft (2005), and protective custody (2001, 1999).

Hutton has prior arrest(s) for possession of marijuana (2004), possession of a firearm in a school zone (2005), criminal trespassing (2005), traffic violations (2006), lewd conduct (2007) and a municipal attachment (2007).

The 34-year-old male victim from the shooting on Urquhart Street has prior arrest(s) for misrepresentation of name/age/address (1994), resisting an officer (1995), possession of marijuana (1995), felon with a firearm (1997), multiple bill (2007), battery (1999), traffic violations (1999), an attachment (2002 and 2004), resisting/obstructing an officer (2005), criminal trespassing (2006), disturbing the peace (2006), possession of crack (2006), aggravated battery (2007), traffic violations (2007) and a warrant (2010).

The 38-year-old male victim from the shooting on Spain Street is currently on probation for possession of cocaine and has prior arrest(s) for warrants (2010, 2008, 2007, 2003, 2002, 1997, 1990), theft (2009, 2008), simple burglary (2008, 1990, 1986), possession of stolen property (2008, 1990, 1989), attachments (2008), domestic violence (2007, 2006) disturbing the peace (2006), possession of crack cocaine (2003, 1997, 1990), traffic violations (2003, 1989), resisting an officer (1990, 1987, 1986), criminal trespass (1989, 1987, 1986, 1985), simple robbery (1989, 1986), flight from an officer (1989), possession of a stolen automobile (1989), disturbing the peace (1988, 1986), theft of auto / other motor (1987), receive stolen things (1987), runaway (1987, 1985), illegal carrying a gun (1987) and simple battery (1986).

The 34-year-old female victim from the shooting on Spain Street has prior arrest(s) for disturbing the peace (1996, 2003), possession of a stolen automobile (1996), simple robbery (1996), possession of stolen property under \$500 (1996) and domestic violence (2006).

Any person who, after the commission of a felony, shall harbor, conceal, or aid the offender, knowing or having reasonable ground to believe that he has committed the felony, and with the intent that he may avoid or escape from arrest, trial, conviction, or punishment shall be charged with **R.S. 14:25; Relative to Accessories After the Fact**. An accessory after the fact may be tried and punished, notwithstanding the fact that the principal felon may not have been arrested, tried, convicted, or amenable to justice.

Whoever becomes an accessory after the fact shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, or imprisoned, with or without hard labor, for not more than five years, or both; provided that in no case shall his punishment be greater than one-half of the maximum provided by law for a principal offender.
